Ally Cunningham, class of 2009 Trustees' scholar, spends her days working on high-profile environmental cases that take her all over the U.S. "I couldn't ask for a better lawyer job," Ally says, "Every day is a new adventure."

During her time at UMKC, Ally received a bachelor's degree in American Studies and was part of the Honors Program. Following graduation, Ally attended law school at the University of Missouri-Columbia. After passing the bar exam, Ally started as an associate at Lathrop Gage in Kansas City. In 2019, she will begin the process of interviewing for partnership.



"I think one of the major tenets of the Trustees' program is to recruit and retain high-caliber students to study and then stay in Missouri, and hopefully, Kansas City. I like to think that I'm a prime example of that philosophy working perfectly," said Ally.

With opportunities presented through the Trustees' program, Ally was able to engage in networking with Lathrope Gage attorneys early in her career. She currently works with the Environmental and Toxic Torts Practice Group while assisting with class action defense and insurance recovery cases. Ally spends a majority of her time traveling for depositions, witness interviews, court hearings and court appearances.

Ally says spending a lot of time in the field is one of the major perks of environmental law. "I love getting to spend time one-on-one with clients and helping them work through their current challenges, and fortunately, Lathrop Gage has afforded me the opportunity to do just that."

Apart from practicing law, Ally recently started The Tricky Pig, an online boutique.

The mission trip provided Tim with an unexpected shift in perspective. "The world is not just where we live in Kansas City, Missouri," he said. He hopes this won't be his last mission trip and, if anything, hopes to dive deeper into this type of service work saying, "I learned the importance of being part of the community, not just someone in the community."
